

Alan Bailes has over 30 years experience with Manitoba Science. Technology and Mines in exploration-supportive mapping in volcanic, sedimentary and metamorphic terranes. He participated has numerous collaborative projects, and most recently has been involved in the Flin Flon **Targeted** Initiative Geoscience continuing his interest in understanding the nature of resource-rich greenstone belts and the controls of mineralization in these belts. He is interested in early earth history and is the Chief Geologist of the Precambrian **Mapping** Section of the Manitoba Geological Survey.

He will be giving us a presentation entitled **Origin of Manitoba: violent, chaotic and ever changing.** It is a talk that presents the early "history" of Manitoba in geological terms.


CFDC will be hosting the first Manitoba Paleontology Symposium (MPS). The MPS will promote the exchange of research between Paleontologists and Geologists internationally. Presentations from researches will be in platform or poster format focusing on **related studies** to the paleontology and geology within Manitoba.

The Canadian Fossil Discovery Centre (CFDC) of Morden Manitoba has the largest collection of marine reptile fossils in Canada. The entire collection has been recovered from the Morden-Miami Area within the province of Manitoba. The collection is a valuable resource in the field of paleontology. More specifically it is one of the resource centers of research conducted on the Western Interior Seaway of North America.

The symposium will take place at the Recreation Centre in Morden, Manitoba, consisting of lectures with

modern technology requirements, catering services, a field trip to the Manitoba Escarpment and a printed abstract volume and promotional material.
